1. Camouflage Skins

- **Snow Biome:** Whiteout, Frosted, and Arctic sets.
- **Forest Biome:** Woodland, Forest Raider, and Ranger sets.
- **Desert Biome:** Desert Raiders and Sandstorm sets.

2. Pay-to-Win Iron Sights

Some weapon skins alter the physical geometry of the weapon's iron sights, making target acquisition substantially easier.

- **The "Glory" AK-47:** Known for its clean, open iron sights.
- **The "From Hell" MP5:** Features a structured front sight post that obstructs less of the target.
- **The "Alien Artifact" SMG:** Offers a futuristic, radiant sight picture that lots of gamers choose over the default model.
