When I say “show me the snaps” to anyone citing a hot take on character, I mean that film study is fundamental. Intangibles aren’t always fireworks; often they’re subtle and in the details:



- **Body Language:** Does the player stay composed under pressure, or do they look frustrated or give up?
- **Communication:** Are they talking with teammates, helping organize the group, or isolated?
- **Effort & Hustle:** Do they show consistent motor and attention to detail on every snap?
- **Response to Mistakes:** Look for how a player reacts immediately after a mistake—do they reset, do they get down on themselves, or show resilience?

Film isn't just about big plays—it's about spotting the traits that manifest in routine moments. These help you build a more holistic picture of mental toughness, leadership, and team orientation.

Analytics Support Character Evaluation, But Don't Replace Film

Analytics give you powerful context but can't stand alone in judging intangibles. For example, pressure rates tell us about a player's technique and awareness, but micro stats can't directly measure leadership or work ethic.

Instead, use analytics to:

- **Validate or Question Film Observations:** If film suggests a player is a high-effort disruptor but pressure rates are low, it's a flag to dig deeper.
- **Spot Trends:** Consistent routes completed under duress may hint at mental resilience.
- **Prepare for Scenario Simulations:** Tools like the Mock Draft Simulator and Game & Fantasy Sim help test how intangible traits might influence outcomes in various contexts.

Remember: analytics should augment your film and interviews; never replace them.

Coach Interviews and Team Captain History Are Gold Mines

Nothing beats firsthand accounts from coaches and teammates who live with the player day in, day out. When you can dive into coach interviews and learn about a player's history as a team captain or informal leader, you tap into qualitative data that often aligns with film observations.



Key Questions to Consider:

1. **Leadership Role:** Has the player held official leadership designations such as team captain or earned peer leadership recognition?
2. **Attitude and Work Ethic:** How do coaches describe the player's approach to practice and preparation?
3. **Crisis Performance:** Any anecdotes about how the player handled tough situations, on or off the field?
4. **Consistency:** Has this leadership and character been demonstrated repeatedly or sporadically?

Also, pay attention to:

- Quotes about how the player lifts teammates up or holds others accountable
- Patterns in off-season work habits and community involvement
- Track record of dealing with adversity, injuries, or personal challenges

Off-Field Context Shapes On-Field Intangibles

Don't ignore off-field factors—they supply essential context. A player embroiled in off-field distractions may struggle to maintain focus at the next level, while community engagement and responsible behavior can hint at maturity and stability.

Look for patterns in:

- Past disciplinary issues or suspensions and how the player responded
- Family background and support system, if known
- Academic performance and willingness to learn
- Interactions with media—are they open and accountable or evasive?

These factors won't tell the full story, but combined with film and interviews, they round out your evaluation.

Beware Consensus and Momentum Bias

One of the biggest pitfalls is letting consensus or draft "momentum" sway your character judgment:

- *Popular narratives* can overinflate perceived intangibles or ignore red flags.
- Bandwagon effects can skew data interpretation, making it seem like a "team sport" where everyone must agree.
- *Don't confound analytics and hype*—just because a player is trending doesn't mean their character has improved overnight.

The antidote is to stay disciplined and systematic, continually returning to your base data (film + interviews + analytics cross-check).
