

Miami Beach has a way of making ordinary decisions feel strangely elevated. A simple breakfast tastes brighter when the light is reflecting off the water. A walk to get coffee turns into a study in architecture, fashion, and people-watching. Even the practical parts of a visit, choosing where to park, when to go out, how long to linger, take on a different rhythm here because the city asks you to slow down and notice it.

Beaches, of course, but not all beaches feel the same

The word "Miami Beach" suggests one continuous stretch of sand, but the experience changes from block to block.
