

Summary of the downtown area

Downtown Syracuse features a mix of **parking garages**, **on-street parking**, and **parking meters**, so your top choice depends on your destination, time of day, and how long you plan to stay. Street Vehicle parking Regulations, Duration Limits, and Compliance

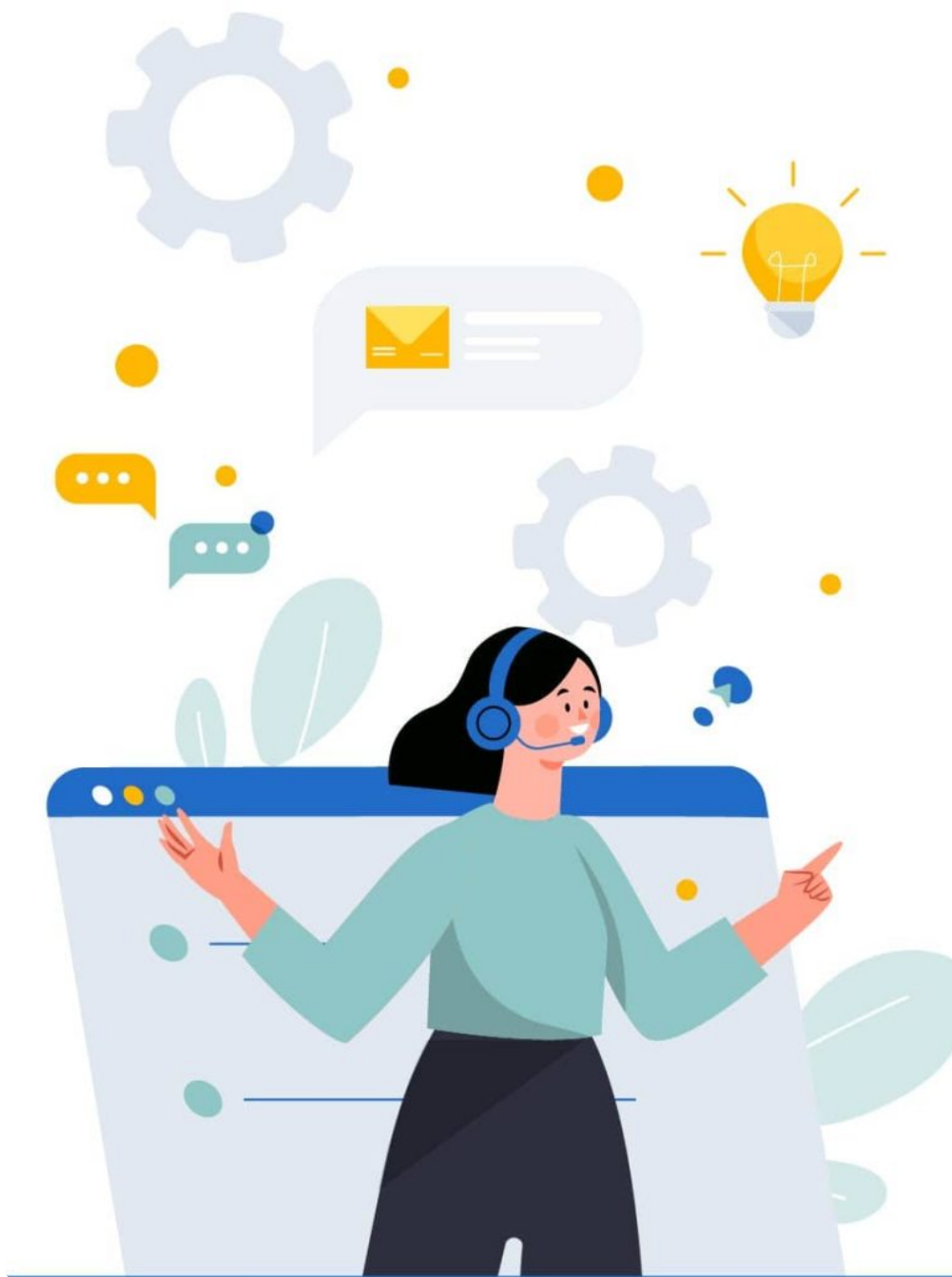
