Low-to-Moderate (50/50 chances minus platform rake) **Jackpot/ Pot** Numerous gamers deposit skins into a communal pool. Each skin contributes to the player's "ticket" share. A random ticket is drawn, and the winner takes the whole pot. High (Depends on the portion of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Replicates the main Valve case openings, typically with higher or personalized chances and special prize swimming pools. High (Typically undesirable return to gamer ratios) **Esports Betting** Wagering skins or money on expert CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based upon live odds. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate danger)
