Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

If you are experiencing recurring crashes, work through the following troubleshooting steps systematically.

1. Confirm the Integrity of Game Files

In time, game files can become corrupted due to unforeseen system shutdowns, insufficient updates, or faulty storage drives. Steam has a built-in tool to check and replace missing or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and select **Properties**.
- Browse to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Wait on the procedure to finish (Steam will automatically download any corrupted files), then reboot your computer system.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

- **NVIDIA Users:** Open GeForce Experience or go to the official NVIDIA website to download the most current Game Ready Driver.

3. Adjust Launch Options

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and select **Properties**.
- Under the **General** tab, try to find **Launch Options**.

 - -high (Sets CS: GO to high CPU priority)

4. Run the Game as Administrator

- Click Apply and OK.

5. Look For Background Application Interference

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party anti-viruses software application (try adding an exemption for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If basic repairs fail to deal with the concern, the problem may lie deeper within your operating system or hardware configuration.

1. Managing Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM supplies a performance increase, CS: GO is infamously conscious hardware instability.

- If you have actually used an aggressive overclock, try dialing it back to standard factory specifications.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is causing the crashes.

2. Reinstalling CS: GO Cleanly

In some cases, leftover custom-made maps, out-of-date workshop items, or heavily modified setup files cause relentless conflicts.

- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- Manually browse to the installation directory (... steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and erase any remaining folders.
- Re-install a fresh copy of the game.
