As the table shows, the odds of unboxing a high-tier product are remarkably slim. A player has roughly a 1-in-400 chance of unboxing a knife or set of gloves (Gold tier).

Moreover, within these tiers, there is an additional layer of randomization called **Wear Rating (Float Value)** and the chance of receiving a **StatTrak™** version.

- **StatTrak™:** Adds a physical counter to the weapon that tracks kills. The chance of getting a StatTrak™ product is approximately **10%** of the basic drop rate.

- **Float Values:** Range from Factory New (0.00 - 0.07) to Battle-Scarred (0.45 - 1.00), considerably impacting the weapon's visual look and market value.

3. The Economics of the Steam Market

The economy surrounding CS: GO skins is completely player-driven, regulated by supply and demand, and assisted in by the Steam Community Market and third-party trading websites.

Because the huge majority of case openings result in low-tier items (Mil-Spec and Restricted skins) that deserve just a couple of cents, the anticipated monetary return (EV) of opening a case is mathematically lower than the £ 2.50 expense of the secret. In brief: **your home often wins.**
