Step 1: Seal Entry Points

- **Inspect all Weep Holes:** Use steel wool or copper mesh to plug openings, then cover with mortar or high-quality exterior-grade sealant.
- **Seal Utility Penetrations:** Install one-part polyurethane sealant or foam around pipes and cables penetrating exterior walls.

- **Replace or Repair Garage Door Bottom Seal:** A tight, intact seal prevents roaches from crawling under the door.

Step 2: Remove All Allergen Dust with HEPA Filter Vacuuming

Regular vacuuming is crucial, but a regular vacuum is not enough to remove allergen proteins hidden in dust. Use a vacuum equipped with a **HEPA filter** to trap and remove these microscopic particles effectively.

This is especially important underneath kitchen appliances, inside cabinets, and along baseboards. The allergen dust builds up in these places over time and keeps triggering asthma symptoms even after visible roaches are gone.
