2. Update Graphics Drivers

- **NVIDIA Users:** Download the GeForce Experience app or check out the NVIDIA site to install the most recent Game Ready Driver.
- **AMD Users:** Use the AMD Software: Adrenalin Edition to look for updates.

Pro-tip: If crashes continue after an upgrade, use a free tool like **DDU (Display Driver Uninstaller)** in Safe Mode to completely clean your old drivers before setting up fresh ones.

3. Tidy Up Launch Options

Launch options can drastically change how CS: GO uses your hardware. Nevertheless, older commands frequently clash with modern-day Windows updates.

Follow these actions to reset your launch choices:

1. Open Steam Library -> > Right-click **CS: GO** -> > **Properties**.
2. Under the **General** tab, find the **Launch Options** text box.

Typical troublesome launch choices to eliminate consist of:

- -high (typically triggers stuttering on modern Windows 10/11 builds)
- -nod3d9ex (obsoleted)
- -threads [number] (can misallocate CPU cores)

4. Disable Overlays and Background Applications

Overlay software regularly hooks into the video game's rendering procedure, triggering immediate crashes to the desktop. Think about disabling the following:

- **Discord Overlay:** Go to User Settings > > App Settings > > Overlay > > Toggle "In-game overlay" off.
- **Steam Overlay:** Steam Settings > > In-Game > > Uncheck "Enable the Steam Overlay while in-game."
- **NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay:** Open GeForce Experience > > Settings > > General > Toggle off "In-Game Overlay."
- **Third-party software:** MSI Afterburner, RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS), and Razer Cortex can occasionally contravene the Source engine.

Advanced Solutions for Persistent Crashes

If the standard actions haven't dealt with the problem, it's time to look much deeper into your operating system and hardware configuration.

Run an SFC Scan (System File Checker)

Corrupted Windows system files can disrupt DirectX and other APIs needed by CS: GO.



1. Press the Windows Key, type cmd.
2. Right-click **Command Prompt** and choose **Run as administrator**.
3. Type sfc/ scannow and press Enter.
4. Let the scan complete, reboot your PC, and test the video game.

Adjust Virtual Memory (Pagefile)

Running out of RAM or Virtual Memory can cause unexpected crashes mid-game. Guaranteeing Windows handles your pagefile immediately can avoid this:

1. Press the Windows Key, type **Advanced system settings**, and open it.
2. Under the **Advanced** tab, click **Settings** under the Performance section.
3. Go to the **Advanced** tab again and click **Change** under Virtual memory.
4. Make sure **Automatically handle paging file size for all drives** is inspected.

Test for Hardware Instability

If your CPU or RAM is aggressively overclocked (through XMP/EXPO or manual tweaks), the Source engine can be notoriously conscious instability.

- Momentarily disable XMP/DOCP in your BIOS to see if crashes stop.
- Run a stress test program like Prime95 or MemTest86 to check for defective hardware parts.

Regularly Asked Questions (FAQ)

Q: Why does CS: GO crash particularly when filling a map?A: Map packing crashes are often tied to missing out on, corrupted, or out-of-date map files. Validating your game cache via Steam or unsubscribing from bothersome Workshop maps generally solves this instantly.

Q: What should I do if my entire PC freezes (Hard Lock) needing a manual reboot?A: A complete system freeze typically points towards a hardware problem-- most commonly GPU instability, getting too hot, or a

stopping working power supply. Check your temperatures using software like HWMonitor and ensure your graphics card motorists are completely up-to-date.

Handling consistent crashes can drain pipes the fun out of any competitive session, however systematically moving through these troubleshooting actions will help you separate the origin. Start by confirming your video game files and upgrading your drivers, then methodically remove away cs2skin.com overlays and conflicting software.
