

If you have already scheduled pest control Hamilton, the next step is just as crucial as the treatment itself: making sure rodents do not come back. Examine your home for openings and entry points

Doors and windows also require attention. Add or replace **weatherstripping** where seals are worn, and make sure **door sweeps** sit snugly with no daylight visible beneath exterior doors. These simple fixes are often overlooked, but they greatly reduce entry opportunities.

Eliminate food, water, and nesting materials

Begin with **food storage**. Keep dry goods in closed containers, and do not leave bread, cereal, or snacks in open packaging. Clean up **food debris** from counters, floors, appliances, and behind stoves. Even small crumbs can sustain rodent activity over time.
