1. **Flat Fee Per Print Sold:** The artist receives a fixed amount for each print sold. This is simple but may not scale with the retail price.
2. **Percentage of Sale Price:** The artist gets a commission, often ranging between 10% and 50%. Marketplaces take their cut first.
3. **Royalty-Based Contracts:** Artists get a pre-agreed royalty rate on all sales, sometimes with bonus tiers for volume.
4. **One-Time Buyout:** The artist is paid once, and the marketplace or store sells indefinitely without additional royalties.

From my experience, shops like **Noirci Studio** tend to opt for transparent, fair royalty arrangements that benefit artists long-term. In contrast, several large anonymous marketplaces lean toward upfront buyouts or low percentages, often leaving the artist with less than 10% of retail.

What Buyers Can Do:

- **Always check if artist name and credits are displayed** before adding to cart.
- **Review marketplace or shop policies** regarding royalties and payout models.
- **Consider buying direct from artist-run or dedicated Black-owned shops** to maximize artist support.
- **Look for limited editions or signed prints** to confirm official status.

AI-Generated Art Concerns and Detection

Generative AI art has exploded recently, bringing new excitement — and also controversy — to the art world. The ease of generating art that appears original raises concerns about:



- Copying or remixing without artist consent
- Anonymous mass uploads with no artist attribution
- Undermining royalties for human creators

- **Gallery wall:** Mix official limited editions with other art you've personally vetted for authenticity.

- **Community spaces or church offices:** Showcase culturally important art while encouraging others to learn about African American art businesses.

Trust me, mentioning where a piece belongs helps buyers picture the artist's vision and relevance, and adds to the emotional experience of owning the art.
