Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

If you are experiencing repeating crashes, work through the following troubleshooting steps methodically.



1. Verify the Integrity of Game Files

With time, video game files can become corrupted due to unanticipated system shutdowns, insufficient updates, or faulty storage drives. Steam has an integrated tool to examine and replace missing or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and choose **Properties**.
- Navigate to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Wait on the process to surface (Steam will instantly download any corrupted files), then restart your computer.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

Your graphics card driver is the bridge in between your hardware and CS: GO. Outdated or damaged drivers are a primary source of video game instability.

- **NVIDIA Users:** Open GeForce Experience or check out the official NVIDIA website to download the most recent Game Ready Driver.
- **AMD Users:** Use the AMD Software: Adrenalin Edition to examine for updates.
- *Pro Tip:* If the crashes began right away after a motorist upgrade, use a tool like **Display Driver Uninstaller (DDU)** in Safe Mode to completely wipe the old motorist before setting up a stable, older variation.

3. Change Launch Options

Certain launch choices can force CS: GO to run in a more steady environment, bypassing introduction videos or requiring particular DirectX modes.

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and choose **Properties**.
- Under the **General** tab, search for **Launch Options**.
- Go into the following advised stable commands (separated by spaces):
 - -novid (Skips the intro video, reducing load-time crashes)
 - -high (Sets CS: GO to high CPU top priority)
 - -autoconfig (Resets video and performance settings to default if the video game declines to launch)

4. Run the Game as Administrator

Permissions concerns can sometimes prevent CS: GO from accessing needed system files or saving setup changes.

- Navigate to your CS: GO setup folder (typically C: \ Program Files (x86) \ Steam \ steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).

- Find the main executable file (csgo.exe).
- Right-click the file and select **Properties**.
- Go to the **Compatibility** tab and examine **Run this program as an administrator**.
- Click Apply and OK.

5. Look For Background Application Interference

Overlay software and hardware monitoring tools often hook into the DirectX pipeline of games, which can cause unexpected crashes. Try disabling the following applications while playing:

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party antivirus software (attempt adding an exclusion for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If fundamental repairs fail to deal with the issue, the issue may lie deeper within your operating system or hardware setup.

1. Managing Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM provides a performance increase, CS: GO is infamously delicate to hardware instability.

- If you have actually applied an aggressive overclock, attempt dialing it back to standard factory requirements.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is causing the crashes.

2. Re-installing CS: GO Cleanly

In some cases, leftover custom maps, out-of-date workshop products, or greatly modified setup files trigger persistent conflicts.

- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- Manually navigate to the setup directory (... steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and erase any remaining folders.
- Reinstall a fresh copy of the video game.

Preventative Maintenance Checklist

To lessen the possibilities of future crashes destroying your gaming sessions, keep this fast upkeep list in mind:

- **Keep Windows Updated:** Install the current cumulative updates for your operating system.

- **Clear DirectX Shader Cache:** Periodically clear your GPU's shader cache via the NVIDIA/AMD control board to prevent rendering mistakes.

- **Clean Your PC:** Dust accumulation can trigger thermal throttling, leading to system freezes and crashes. Tidy your hardware components every couple of months.
