Uncommon, generally better designs.	Classified	Pink	~ 3.2% Rare, extremely sought-after weapon finishes.
Covert	Red	~ 0.64%	Extremely rare, flagship weapon skins.
Special (Exceedingly Rare)	Gold	~ 0.26%	Knives or gloves (the ultimate prize).

Wear Conditions (Float Values)

Aside from rarity, every skin is designated a **Float Value** in between 0.00 and 1.00, which identifies its physical wear and tear.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07

- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.44
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00

Note: Some skins are "wear-capped," suggesting they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower-float variations remarkably important.

The Mathematics of Opening Cases
