- **Play 1v1s for Higher Win Probability:** Statistically, a 1v1 offers you a 50% possibility to win, whereas a 4-player free-for-all drops your odds to 25%. If your goal is to grind and sustain a balance, adhere to head-to-head matches.
- **View the Meta and Case Odds:** Research which cases offer the very best circulation of "safe" mid-tier skins versus high-risk knives. Some custom cases on fight websites are weighted in a different way than standard

Dangers and Safety Considerations
