How Skins Enter the Game

Skins normally get in the Rust community through two main avenues:

1. **The Item Store:** Facepunch launches a curated batch of community-created skins every Thursday. Gamers can purchase these straight from the main Rust Item Store at a fixed, low rate. When eliminated from the shop, these items can just be acquired through trading or the Steam Community Market.
2. **Twitch Drops:** Periodically, Facepunch partners with popular streamers to use special, account-bound skins for seeing partnered broadcasts. These can not be bought or sold on the market.
