- **Night Visibility Skins:** Some items feature glow-in-the-dark aspects (frequently referred to as "Glow-in-the-Dark" or "Emissive" skins). While they make you much easier to see in the evening, they allow gamers to navigate their bases or craft items in pitch-black spaces without switching on lights.
- **Sight Clarity Skins:** Certain weapon skins-- especially for the Assault Rifle (AK) and Semi-Automatic Rifle (SAR)-- customize the iron sights, providing a cleaner, less obstructed view when intending down sights.
