

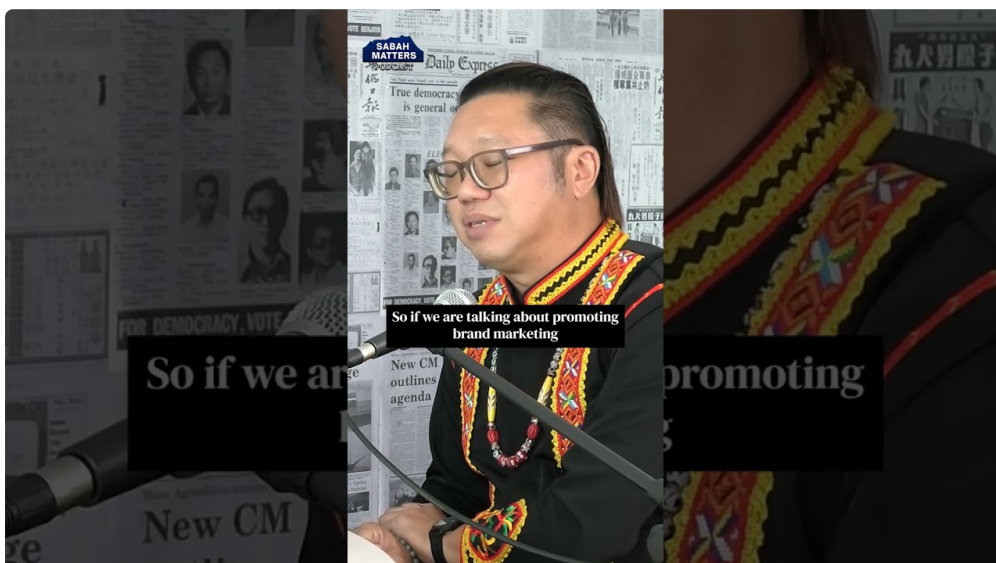
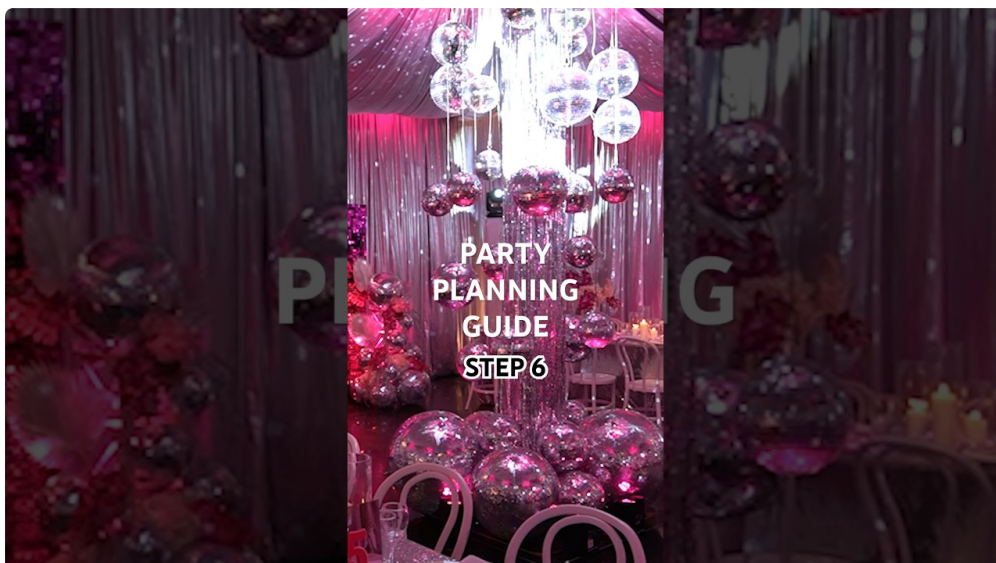
Balancing Family Expectations Together with Fun for a Teenager's Celebration in the Malaysian Context
