After that week expires, players can trade them with friends or offer them on the **Steam Community Market** for Steam Wallet funds.

This creates a dynamic marketplace determined by supply and demand. Unusual skins, ceased items, and those favored by popular material developers can escalate in value.

- **Supply:** How numerous copies of the skin were bought during its time in the main shop. Low-supply items frequently appreciate in value.
