

A garage door that refuses to close is often experiencing a sensor problem rather than a serious mechanical failure. The sensors must face each other at the correct height and angle. Even a small shift in a bracket can interrupt the beam. A blinking sensor light, a dark indicator, or lights showing different colors may point to an alignment, power, or wiring issue. Because the sensors are part of the garage door safety system, they should not be bypassed.

Indicators You Need Garage Door Sensor Repair

The most common symptom is that the **garage door will not close**, or it shuts only when you continue holding the wall button the entire time. This issue shows that the opener may be recognizing a safety fault. Other warning signs include:

- **Blinking sensor lights** or a single *blinking sensor light* on one side.
- Visible **out-of-alignment sensors** that do not face each other directly.
- A garage door that begins closing and immediately reverses.
- A garage door remote that raises the door but cannot close it.
- Sensor brackets that rattle, flex, or move when the track is touched.
